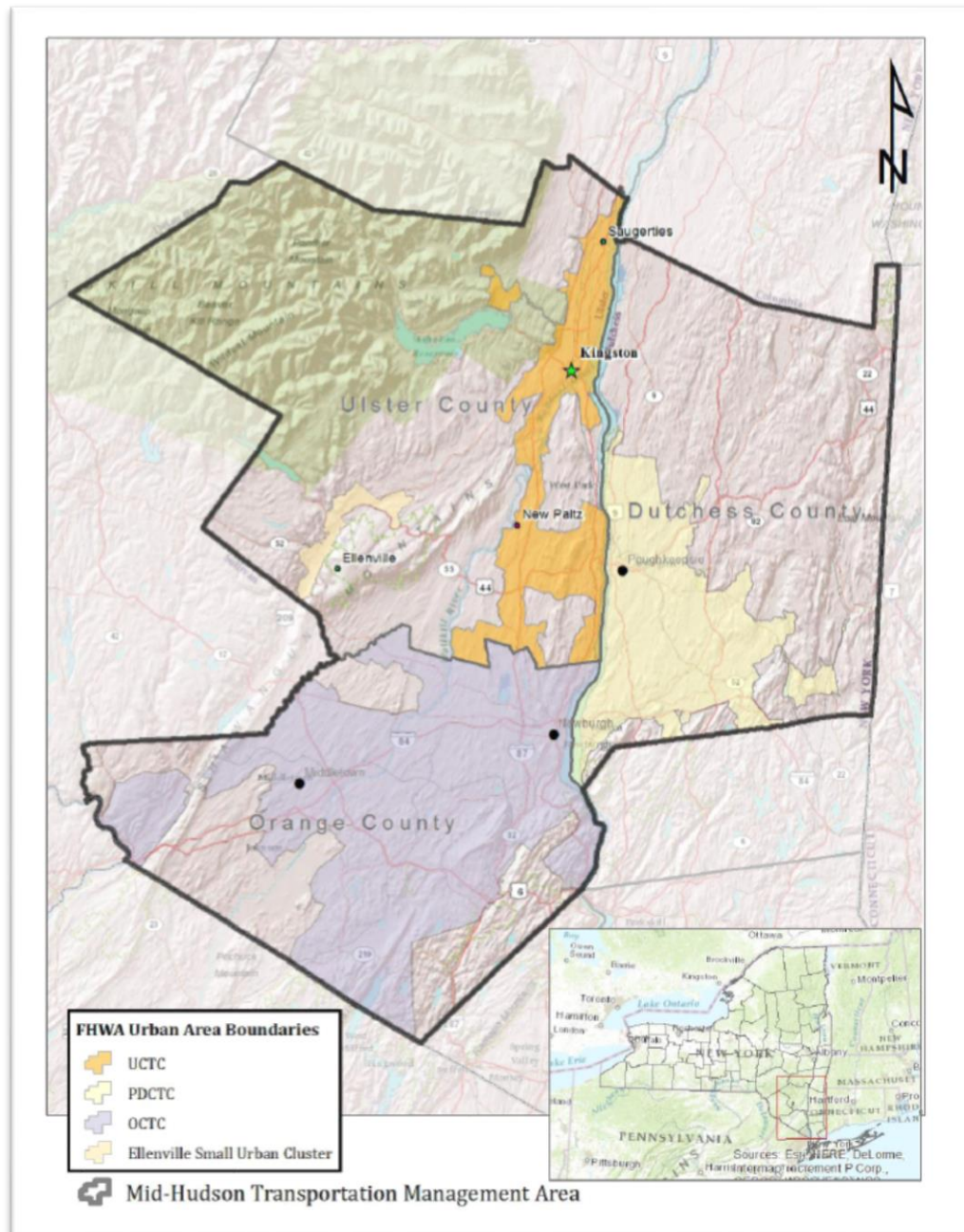

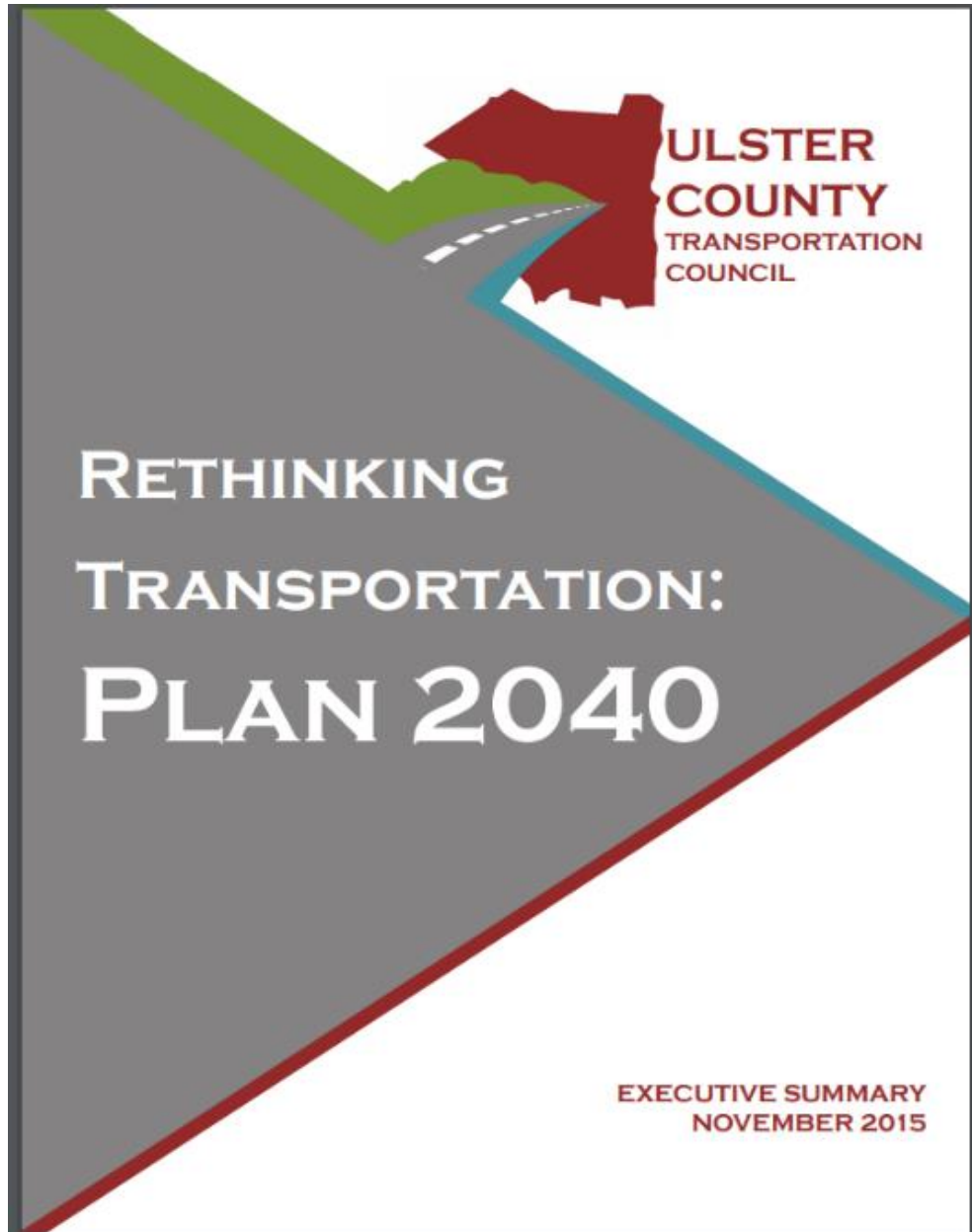

What Is UCTC?

- The Ulster County Transportation Council is responsible for developing transportation plans and making decisions about how Federal transportation funds will be spent.
- The UCTC Policy Committee is the decision-making body



What Is a Long-Range Transportation Plan?

- Federally-required document
- Updated every 5 years
- Strategy and capital improvement program developed to guide the effective investment of public funds in multimodal transportation facilities
- All of UCTC's products and actions must be in accordance with it

Important Considerations



This is 25-year plan! Only a portion of the recommendations will be accomplished in the next 5 years.



The plan is “fiscally constrained.” UCTC can include only projects for which they can pay.

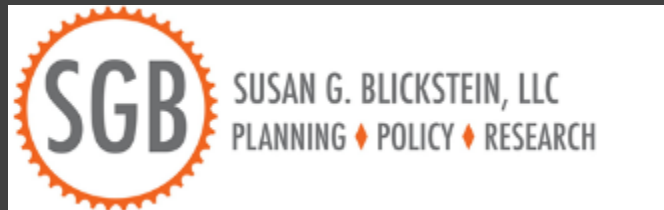


The plan is updated every 5 years to account for unexpected changes and trends.



The plan is SMART – **S**pecific, **M**easurable, **A**ctionable, **R**ealistic, and **T**imebound

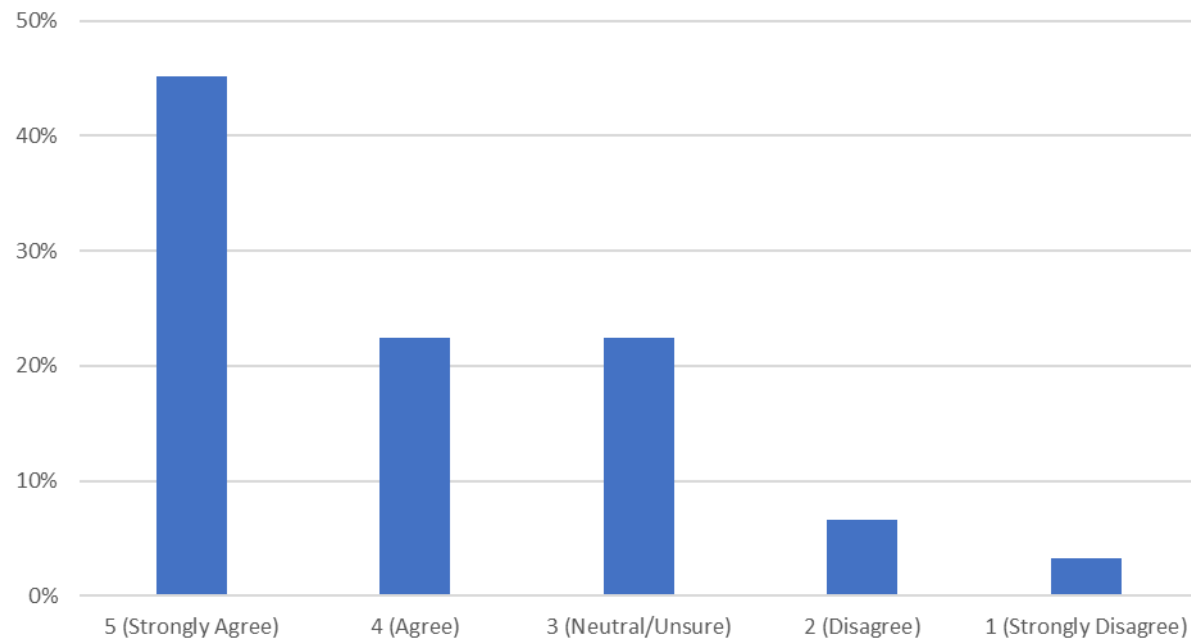
Public Outreach to Date: Survey Findings



- Stakeholder focus groups held in July
- Survey open July 13, 2020 to August 4, 2020
- 365 responses
- Majority live or live and work in Ulster County (85%)
- Almost two-thirds (65%) of participants between 35 and 64 years old
- Majority of participants identify as White and non-Hispanic/Latinx
- Surveys are one of several outreach tools to gather public input – stakeholder groups were also held
- Survey provides a window into travel modes/trip purpose, public input on the Plan’s draft Vision Statement and Goals, and other transportation trends and improvements

Feedback on UCTC's Draft Vision Statement

Two-thirds strongly agree (45%)/agree (22%) with the Vision; almost 25% neutral/unsure (10% disagree/ strongly disagree).



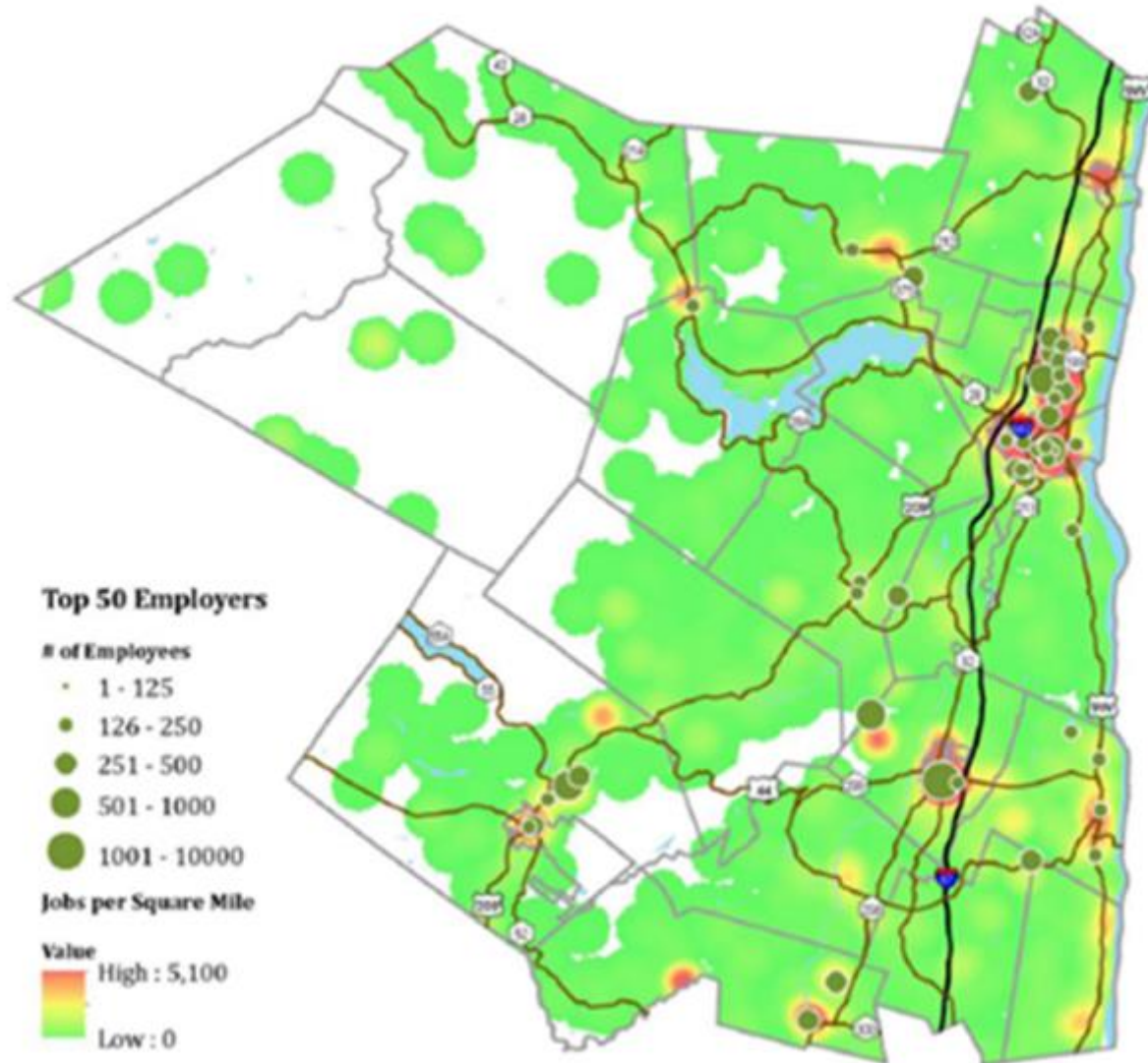

1. Expand public transit coverage and frequency (including possibility of light rail) and strengthen transit connectivity between Ulster and Dutchess County.
2. Improve and expand bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure.
3. Provide more alternative transportation options and reduce dependence on single-occupancy vehicles.
4. Make the transportation system more sustainable and resilient.
5. Strengthen rail trail connectivity in the region.

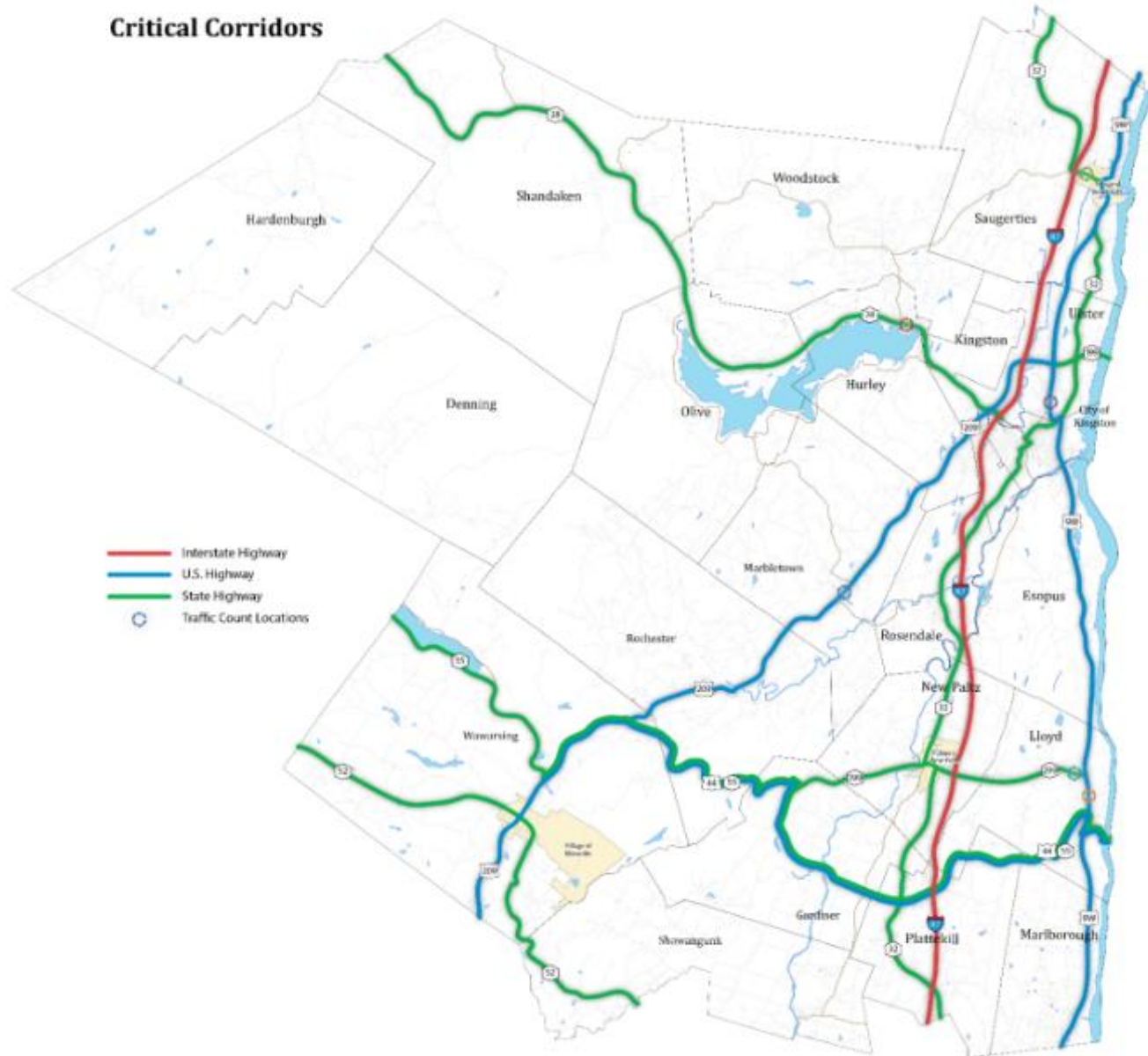
Figure 3.9: Employment and the Top 50 Major Employers within Ulster County^{xiii}

- Transportation demand is based on travel patterns - where people live and places they go (work, school, shopping, health care...)

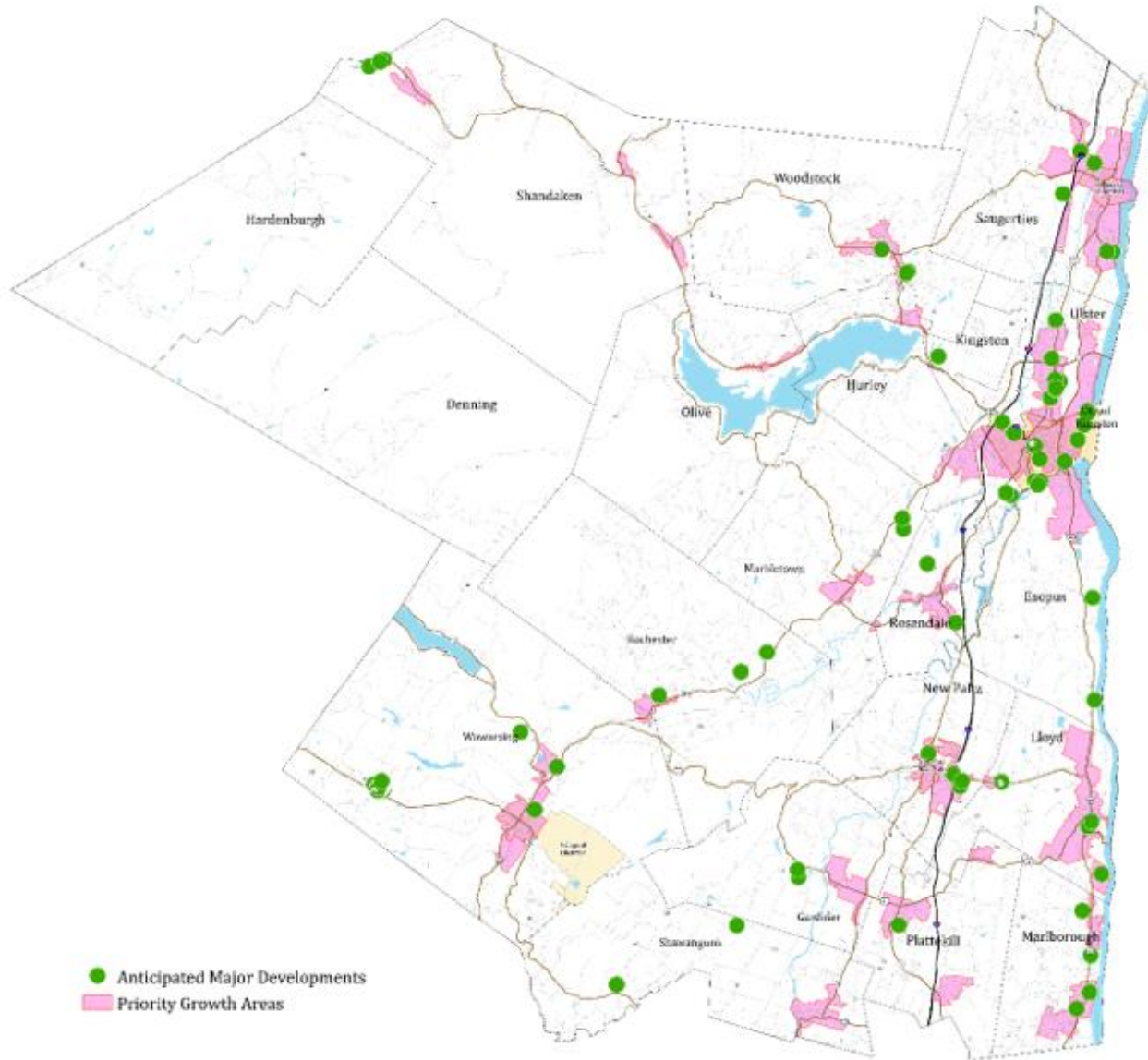
Figure 4.6: Critical Transportation Corridors

- Travel patterns follow fixed routes, some of which are more critical than others...

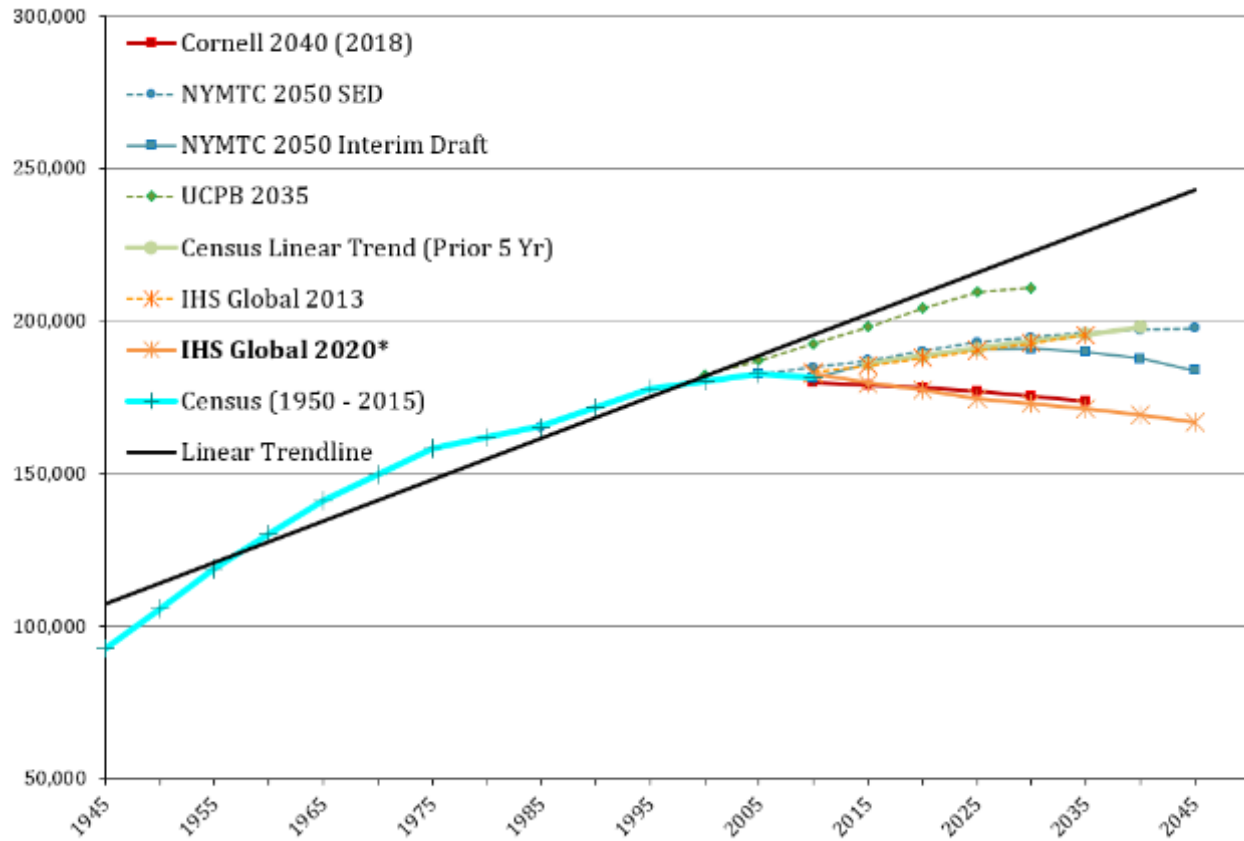
Figure-3.12: Anticipated Major Developments and Priority Growth Areas xvii

 - Unknown beyond 5-10 years...

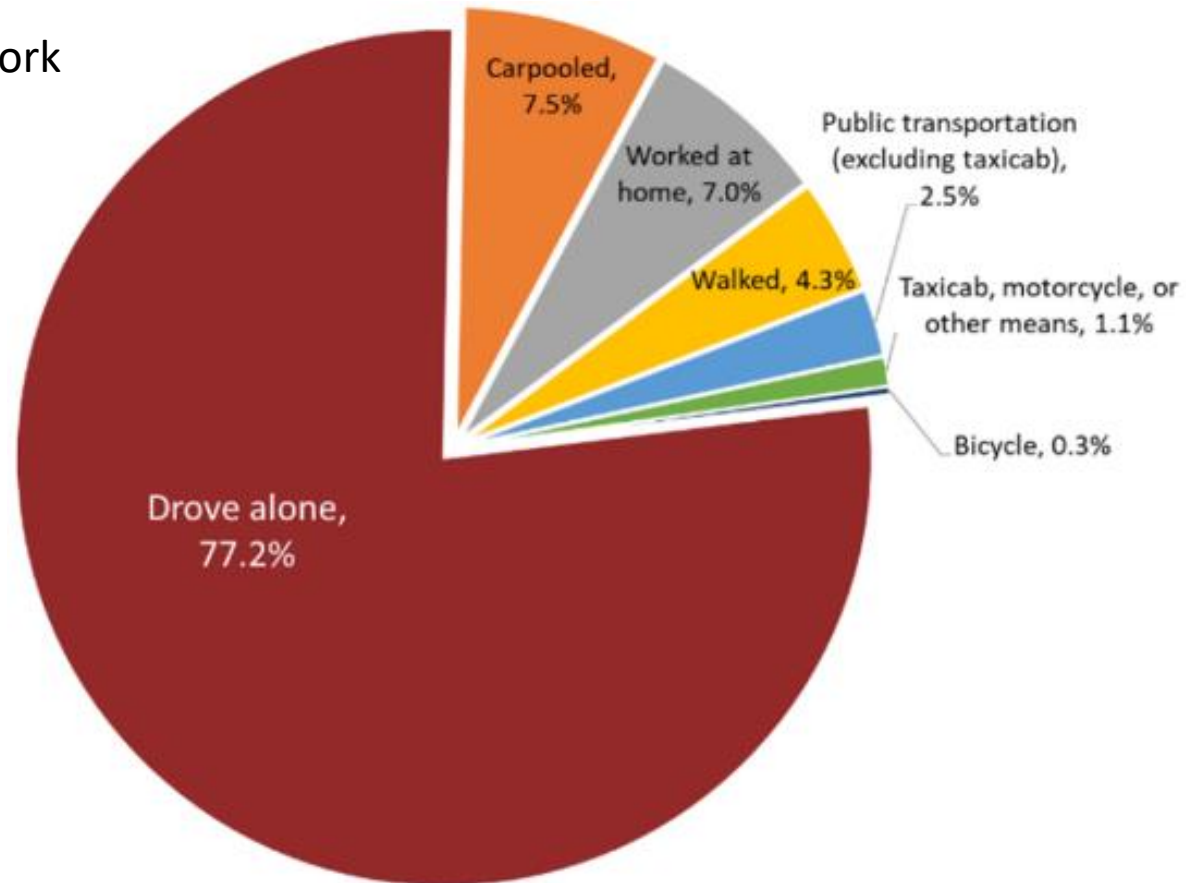
How Do We Travel?

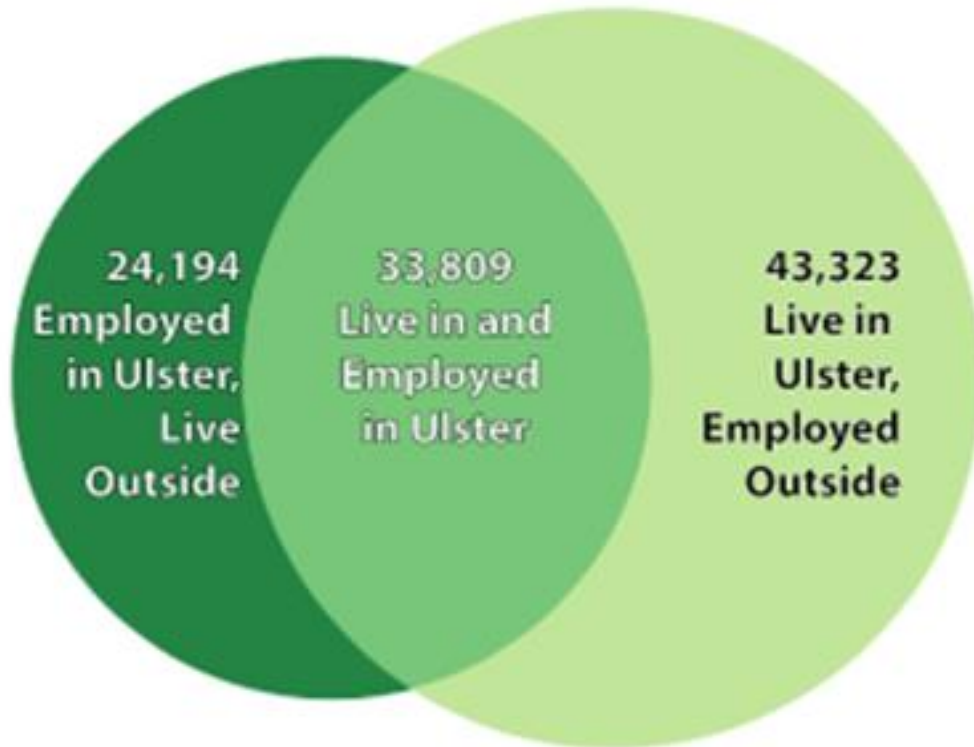
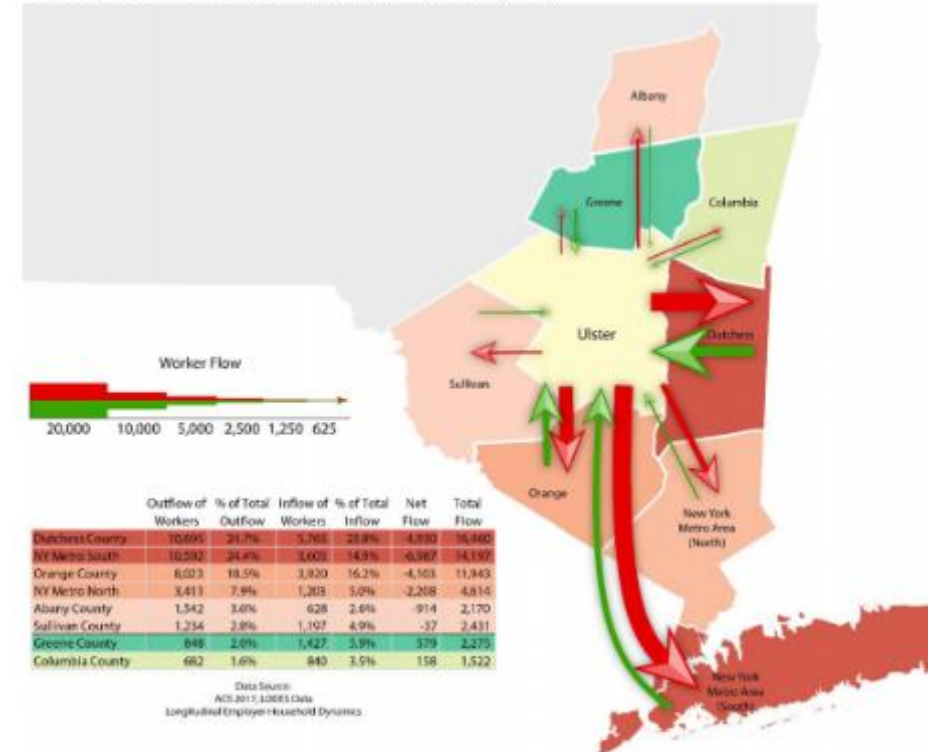
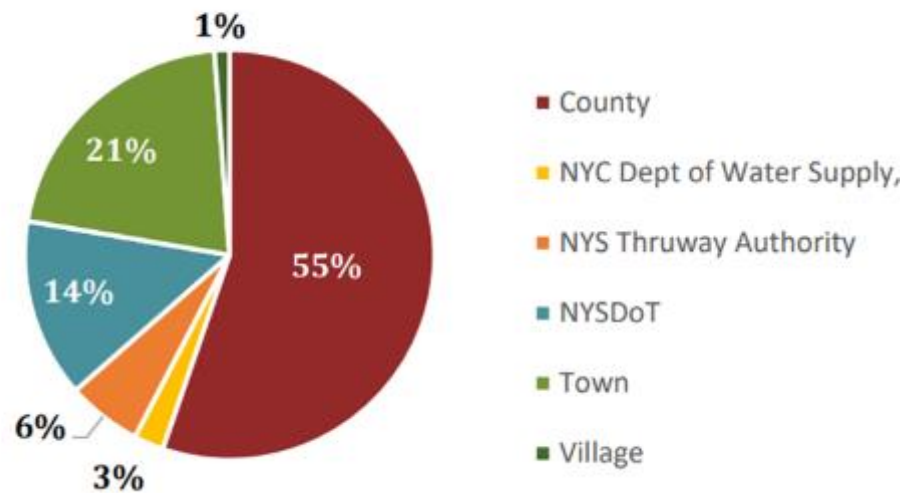


Figure 4.8: Commutation To and From Ulster County

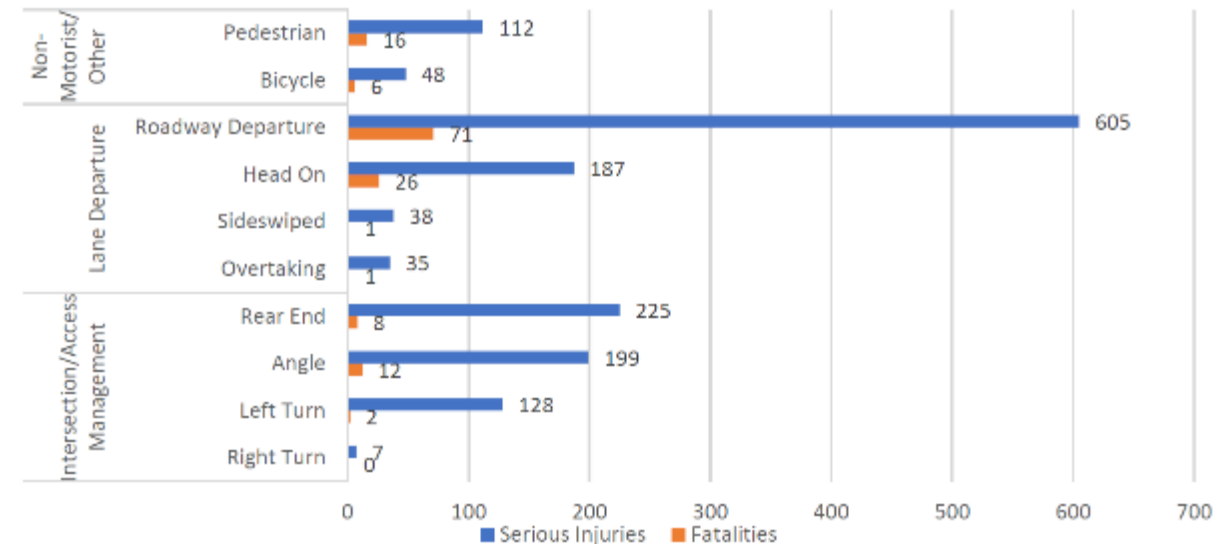
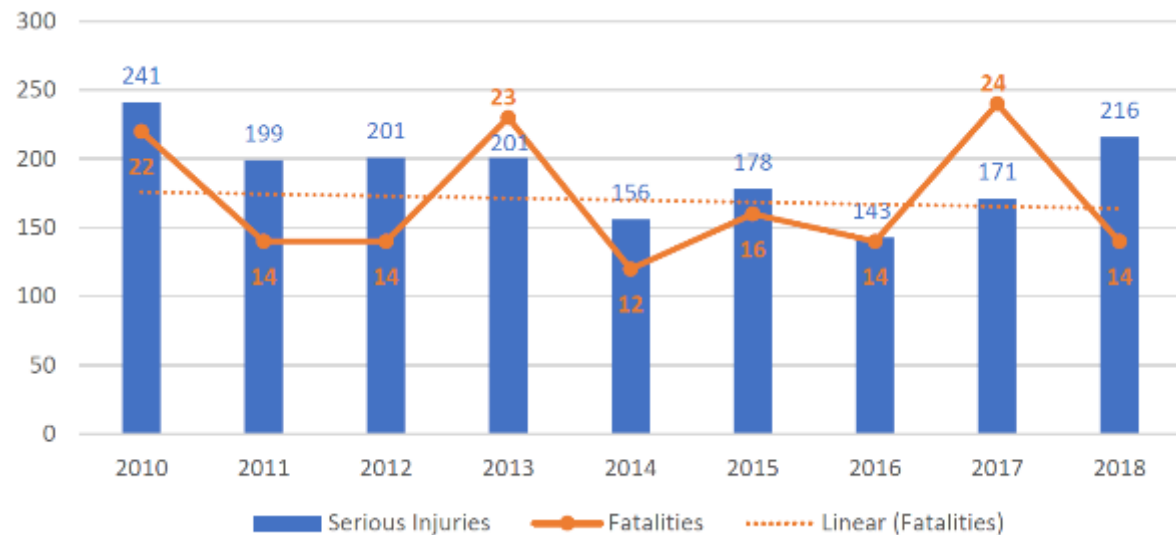

Figure 4.4: Structurally Deficient Bridges by Owner

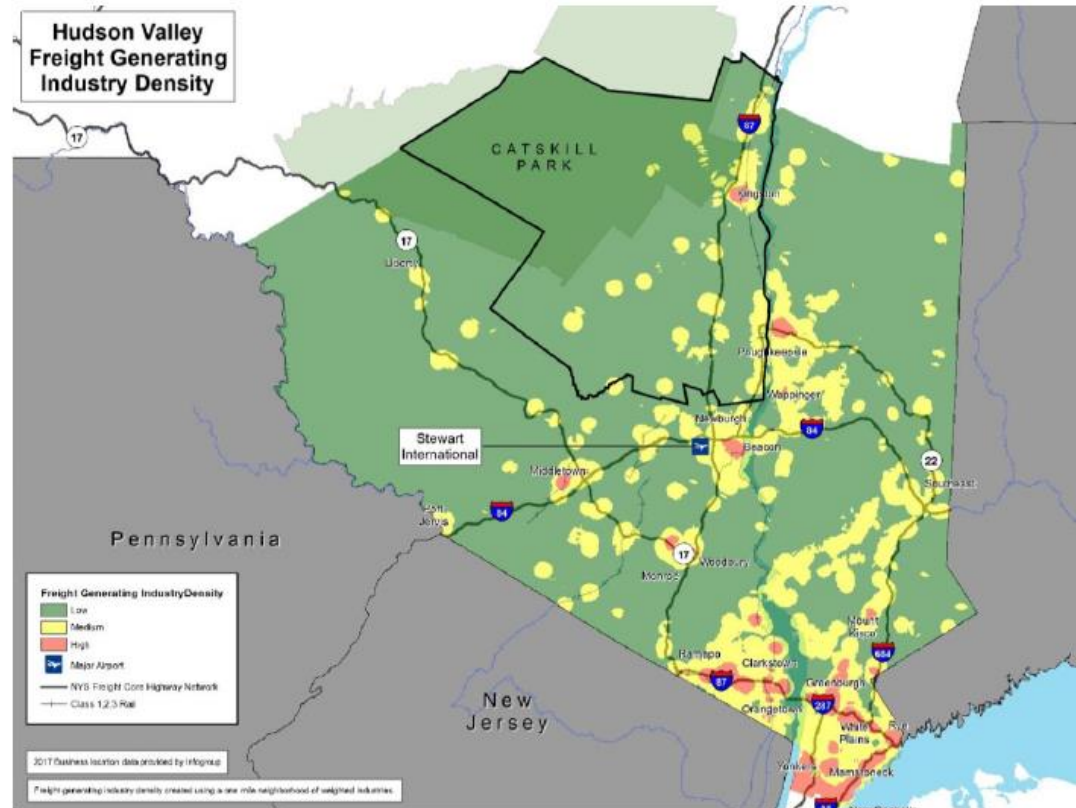

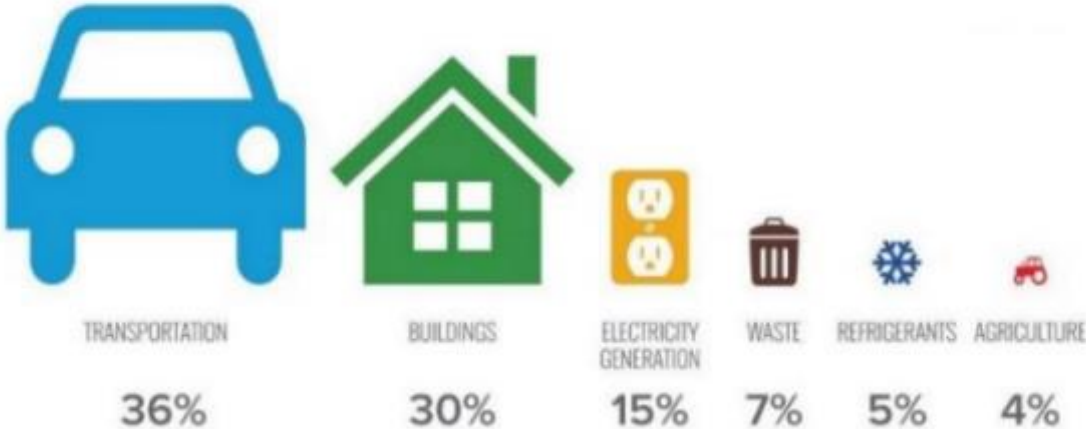
Freight Movement

Figure 4.17: Hudson Valley Region Freight-Generating Industry Density^{vii}



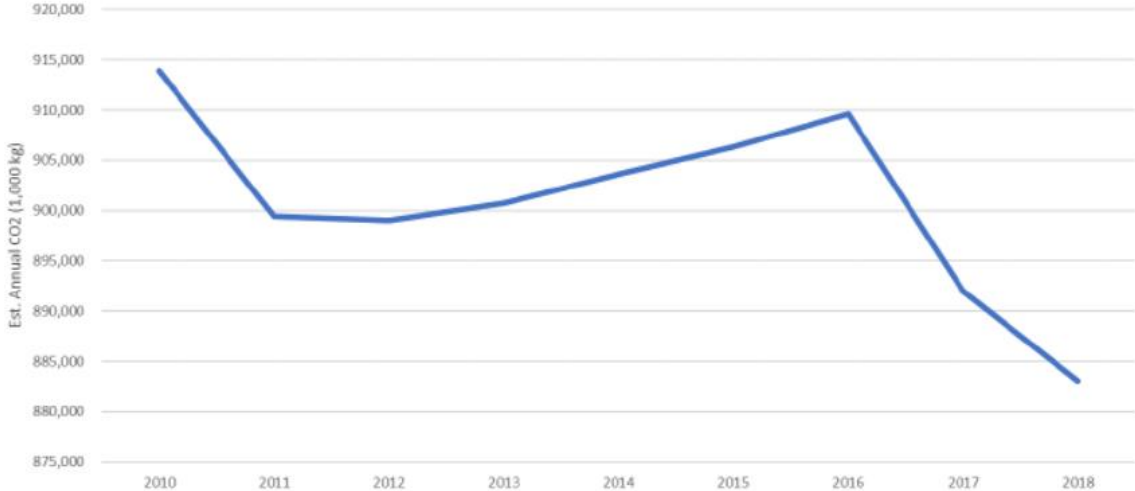

Main Sources Of Greenhouse Gases in NYS

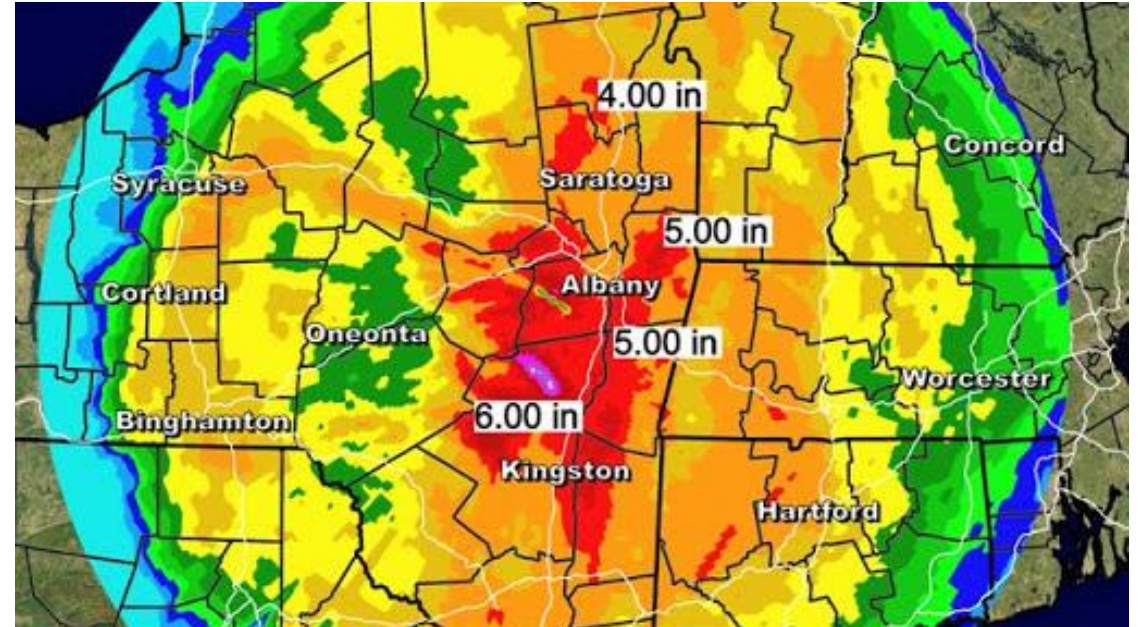

Goals for the Future

System Preservation	Invest in transportation system infrastructure to bring all facilities and modes into a state of good repair.
Economic Vitality	Invest in transportation system improvements that are necessary to support the current regional economy and future proposals for economic development.
Safety	Improve the safety of all users of the transportation system by responding to identified safety deficiencies and proactively addressing future safety needs.
Sustainability	Ensure that transportation system users have a secure environment and that the transportation system provides residents of Ulster County with adequate service in the context of severe weather events.

Goals for the Future

Mobility and Reliability

Provide for **efficient and reliable** travel by all modes by investing in strategies that mitigate both recurring and non-recurring congestion.

Accessibility and Connectivity

Create and maintain a **well-connected** transportation system that provides access throughout Ulster County for people and goods travelling by all modes.

Environment

Contribute to making Ulster County a **sustainable** place by protecting and enhancing the natural and built environment, reducing greenhouse gas and other motor vehicle emissions, supporting sustainable construction and maintenance practices, and coordinating land use and transportation plans

Equity

Develop and integrate strategies that seek to mitigate negative effects related to the transportation system that impact the **most vulnerable** members of the community, such as low-income residents, minorities, children, persons with disabilities, and older adults.

Investment Decisions

Using goals, measures, and data to make better informed decisions about how to invest transportation funding.



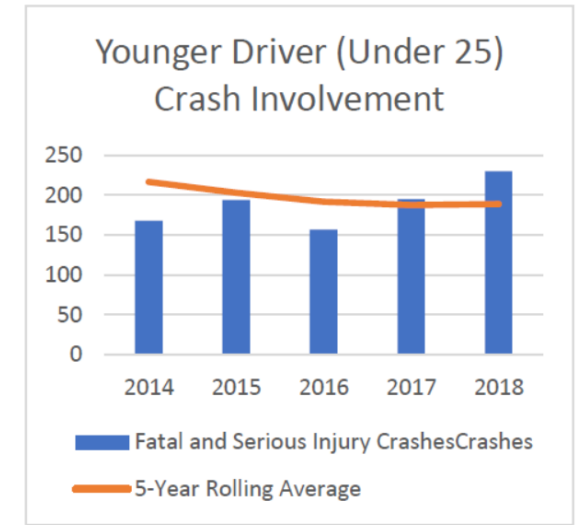
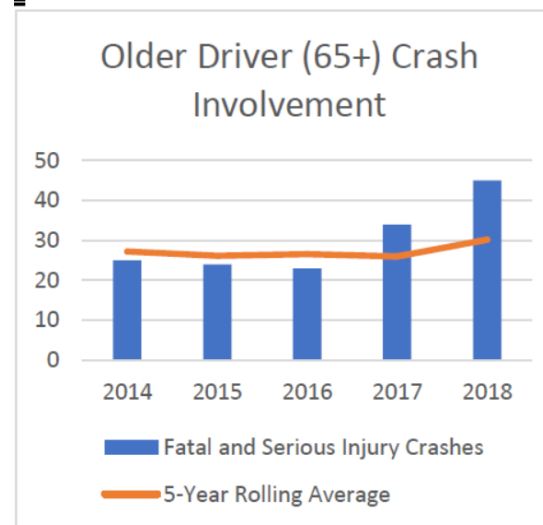
Aimed at a Better Performing Transportation System

Setting targets, developing plans, reporting results, and being accountable for performance.



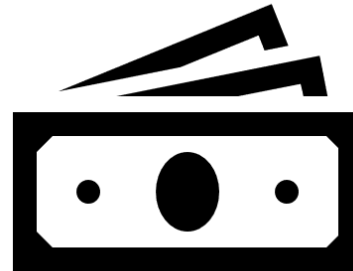
For Connected and Productive Communities
